Opening letter by David Horsfall

I hope you had a great Easter, and I imagine that thoughts are now turning towards going away. However, let's not get ahead of ourselves, for this month we have two more big moments in the Church calendar: Ascension Day, and Pentecost. Limitations of space prevent me from going into close detail on both of these, so I'll focus on the first, Ascension Day.

"[Jesus] was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight. They [his disciples] were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. 'Men of Galilee', they said, 'why do you stand here looking in to the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven'." Acts 1:9-11



For some considerable time now, many Christians have been unsure what to make of the Ascension. In the Church of England Lectionary (a sort of services calendar), Ascension Day is written in red letters, which makes it a Big Deal, to be marked by a special service. All through my ministry, I have held such a service, and all through my ministry, the turnout has been tiny. We're talking single figures, or not far into doubles. Of course, Ascension Day is always on a Thursday, and midweek services of any kind don't tend to draw crowds, but I still say that we don't always know what to make of it. We might even go so far as to suggest that some of us find the idea embarrassing. After all, we are told in Acts chapter 1 that Jesus rose from the ground and went up to heaven. But don't we all know by now that heaven is not "up there"? Isn't this all rather primitive?

Well, not so fast – sometimes we can be too clever to use our intelligence. We should not assume, for instance, that people of the first century were a herd of gullible primitives. Yes, there was a lot of superstition around, but then there

still is. The fact is that many in those times would have found the Ascension story just as startling as we do, and would have felt the same temptation not to believe it. We also bark up the wrong tree if we imagine that Luke is trying to tell us that heaven is "up there".



The precise location of heaven is not the issue, for Jesus is demonstrating to his disciples that he is going out of this world and into another. The best way to do this is surely to rise from the earth and disappear into a "cloud" (more about that in a moment). The point is that Jesus' bodily presence has come to an end and he was gone. There was no point in looking for him.

As for this cloud, well, in the Bible, a cloud is often a way of describing God's glory, and that seems to be the obvious meaning here. This is very, very much more than airborne water! This is a human way of



describing the indescribable. Jesus was leaving the human world in his bodily form and entering the glory of his Father - entering heaven.

But we haven't finished yet. You see, this is the culmination of the whole of Jesus' earthly ministry. God had become human (born as a baby!), lived among us, died among us, and had been raised from the dead. Sins can be forgiven, and death has been conquered. All is complete. Jesus is entering the presence of his Father as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Shortly, at Pentecost, the Spirit of Jesus will come, and his presence on earth will continue by this Spirit. The Ascension is in fact a victory procession, and when Jesus comes again (as he will) it will not this time be as a baby in a manger, but as the risen, ascended, glorious King. Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again, as we cry in our Communion services, and the Ascension points to all of these. There is so much to celebrate and rejoice in. All is complete. All is secure, for ever. Forget feeling embarrassed - let's get excited!

Blessing of the Oils service

Our wonderful clergy and lay ministers (readers) attended a special service on Maundy Thursday at Derby City Cathedral.

Why is there a Blessing of Oils service?

Our own baptism is the sacramental sign of our union with Christ, and of God's gift to us of his Holy Spirit, to make us God's children by adoption and grace, and to equip us for the share that all Christians have in Christ's own ministry. The New Testament speaks of this gift of the Holy Spirit as an anointing (1 John 2.20-27; 2 Corinthians 1.21-22).



From an early date, it became customary to trace the sign of the cross in oil on the heads of candidates for baptism, and to anoint them again after baptism with the perfumed oil of chrism – a sign of incorporation into the prophetic, priestly and royal life of Jesus Christ. At the same time, the Letter of James urges its recipients to anoint the sick with oil (James 5.15), as a sign of the healing and forgiveness that are also given through the Holy Spirit (cf Mark 6.13). These are the biblical roots of the ancient custom of using oils in the life of the Church, and of the three particular oils – of catechumens, of the sick, and of chrism – that are prepared in the Chrism Eucharist.

In the course of Christian history, they have come to be used in many ways – especially, as in the Old Testament, for the setting apart of people and things for a special place in the life of the Church, for bishops and priests at their ordination, for kings and queens at their crowning, and for churches and altars at their consecration.

There is a more recent custom, introduced first into the Roman Catholic Church by Pope Paul VI in the middle of the twentieth century, that the Chrism Eucharist is also an occasion for the renewal of commitment to ministry. As the priests gathered around their bishop on Maundy Thursday, to receive the oils to take back to their parishes, he suggested that they should renew their commitment to serve Christ.

This is appropriate on this day, when we remember that Christ consecrated himself to his Father's service and expressed his obedient self-gift in the institution of the Eucharist and in the agony of Gethsemane, and prayed for the unity of his disciples. It is now a widespread Anglican practice for deacons, Readers and authorized lay ministers to be associated with the bishop and priests in the renewal of commitment to ministry.

It is important to distinguish this renewal, which has to do with the commitment of authorized ministers (lay or ordained) to particular and defined ministries in the life of the Church, from the renewal of the commitment of all God's people to the royal and priestly ministry they have received in baptism. This second renewal, which is theologically prior to the first, properly takes place in the reaffirmation of baptismal promises at the Easter Liturgy
